

INTEGRITY COUNCIL TRIES TO MAKE OTHERS HAPPIER



Integrity Council is noted by many people for the thousands of dollars it gives to charitable works, but the council also realizes the importance of engaging “one on one” with those receiving their assistance.

Feeding their “homeless friends” who come to Arch Street United Methodist Church in down-town Philadelphia Sunday nights is becoming a very meaningful tradition for the council members.

On Sunday evening, November 9, 2014, thirteen Integrity members prepared and served a hot dinner of baked ziti, fresh salad, Italian bread, and assorted cakes and cookies to the 198 people without homes who came seeking a warm place to pause peacefully and enjoy a nutritious

meal that evening. The Royal Arcanum folk had purchased and prepared all the food ahead of time, then warmed it up and served it.

Homelessness in our cities seems to be increasing. When Integrity first started this dinner program, there were about one hundred people seeking a good meal; now there are approximately 200 guests, many of whom are transients, such as one young man who was thrown out of his home because of his sexual orientation. Many are people with mental and emotional instability, and some are addicts. Others are just “down on their luck.”


Before departing for home, the group savored some home baked cookies and exchanged good wishes for a happy holiday season.

INTEGRITY COUNCIL FRATERNAL PROJECT

Pennsylvania's Integrity Council #586 in Philadelphia conducted a fraternal project which supported two charitable causes. The council purchased twenty pies from MANNA (Metropolitan Area Neighborhood Nutrition Alliance). This organization provides nourishment and nutritional counseling to men and women in the greater Philadelphia area and southern New Jersey who are coping with life-threatening illnesses. Results of a research study recently conducted by MANNA indicated that clients who received MANNA's medically-appropriate meals had lower healthcare costs, and spent less time in the hospital than similar people who did not receive meals. The organization has delivered more than 10 million meals over its 24 year history, and strives to promote hope and healing to ensure that people live longer, healthier lives.

The pies purchased were then donated to St. John's Hospice. The poor and disenfranchised men who are assisted through the programs of the hospice were able to partake in a warm holiday dinner in an atmosphere of friendship and acceptance. The pies supplemented the desserts which were prepared one evening for the meal for nearly 100 men. The hospice is an emergency short-term residence with a mission to be a community where homeless persons find dignity, respect, nourishment and opportunities for new beginnings.

Both organizations expressed their gratefulness for the generosity exemplified by Integrity Council. Such fraternal support enables their work in serving those in need to continue in the community.

MEDORA COUNCIL ACTIVE IN COMMUNITIES













The chart below reveals the comparison of 1975 and 2014 (as of June 2014), with not all the changes for the better.

public school system has eroded to 26% today from 62% in 1975. Many people now favor Charter schools, paid with public funds, as an alternative to our current public education system, where the classes are smaller, the school day is longer and the teachers are not part of the traditional school system. Students in these schools have improved their test scores considerably. Royal Arcanum is a strong supporter of education, as shown by our superb college scholarship awards, grants and educational loans for qualified members.
