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LETTER FROM THE EDITOR:

The top 5 technology innovations for senior citizens focus on enhancing health, safety, independence, and social connection. These innovations have the potential to significantly improve the lives of seniors by addressing key challenges related to aging. Here's a summary of the top 5:

I. Wearable Health Devices & Smartwatches

Example: Apple Watch Series 8 or Fitbit Charge 5 How it helps: Wearables are increasingly popular among seniors for monitoring vital signs such as heart rate, blood oxygen levels, and steps taken. Advanced models like the Apple Watch feature fall detection, ECG monitoring, and emergency alerts, allowing seniors to stay

on top of their health and quickly alert family members or emergency responders if needed. These devices also send notifications to remind seniors to move or take medication. Key benefits: Fall detection and emergency alerts, monitors chronic conditions like heart disease or hypertension, encourages physical activity and overall wellness.

2. Voice-Activated Assistants

Example: Amazon Alexa, Google Assistant, Apple Siri How it helps: Smart voice

assistants are transforming how seniors interact with technology. By using voice commands, seniors can control various aspects of their environment without needing to physically manipulate devices. They can set reminders, make calls, get news updates, control smart home devices (e.g., lights, thermostats), and access entertainment—all hands-free.

Key benefits: Voice-controlled convenience for daily tasks, offers companionship and reduces isolation, can assist with emergency calls and alerts, and useful for seniors with limited mobility or vision impairments.

3. Personal Emergency Response Systems (PERS)


Example: Life Alert, Philips Lifeline, Bay Alarm Medical How it helps: PERS are wearable devices, typically worn as a pendant or wristband, that allow seniors to call for help with the push of a button. Modern versions often include fall detection and can send alerts to emergency responders, family, or caregivers when help is needed. Many are integrated with smart home systems and can

even link to mobile apps for real-time monitoring. Key benefits: Instant access to emergency help, fall detection and automatic alerts, peace of mind for seniors and their families, enhances safety while living independently.

4. Telemedicine & Virtual Healthcare

Example: Teladoc, Amwell, Doctor On Demand

How it helps: Telemedicine enables seniors to consult



reduces travel and the associated

risks for older adults, helps with

chronic disease management and mental health support, and real-time consultations, prescriptions, and health monitoring.



5. Smart Home Devices for Safety and Convenience

Example: Ring Video Doorbell, Nest Thermostat, Philips Hue Smart Lighting

How it helps: Smart home technologies allow seniors to live more independently and safely in their homes. Smart doorbells let them see and talk to visitors before opening the door, reducing the risk of scams or unwanted visitors. Smart lighting can be controlled remotely or set to automatic schedules, while smart thermostats adjust the temperature for comfort. Motion sensors can alert caregivers if there is unusual activity, such as falls or inactivity.

Key benefits: Enhanced security with smart cameras and doorbell systems, home automation for ease of living (e.g., lights, temperature control), energy efficiency and safety, and alerts for caregivers in case of emergencies or health concerns.

It is assembled with a light blue ribbon to represent the attribute of Mercy; one of the three founding principles – 'Virtue, Mercy, Charity.' The jewel, enhanced with the image of a crown, a distinguishing symbol of the Society, was traditionally presented to the

regent during the Installation of Officers ceremony, along with the council gavel, charter, and Royal Arcanum Constitution.

This piece is from American Beauty Council #2487, New York, an all-women's council in the Royal Arcanum. It was contributed to the fraternal memorabilia collection by Life Member of the Supreme Council, Sister Louise Reynolds before her passing.





TEACHING FINANCE TO OUR CHILDREN



Teaching kids finance is an important step in helping them develop responsible money habits and an understanding of the value of money. A good plan should be engaging, ageappropriate, and gradually build on concepts over time. Here's a step-by-step guide to creating an effective plan:

I. Start with Basic Concepts (Ages 4-7)

At this stage, kids are just starting to understand the idea of money, its value, and basic concepts related to spending and saving. You can start by discussing what money is, its concept and purpose, and how it's used to buy things. Teach that money is earned by doing work, and it can be spent to buy things. Finally, cover the concept of saving and the benefits of not spending right away. At this age, playing with play money and using a savings jar can help a child grasp these concepts.

2. Introduce More Complex Ideas (Ages 8-11)

At this age, kids can grasp more detailed concepts related to budgeting, saving for goals, and the importance of smart spending. One great budgeting activity to reinforce these ideas is to have them create a simple budget plan and then track earnings and expenses. For setting goals, have the child select something that they may want to buy and then have them create a savings plan over time to raise that money.



3. Focus on Earning, Saving, and Investing (Ages 12-15)

Teens are old enough to handle more sophisticated financial concepts like earning money through jobs, understanding interest, and the importance of investing.

You can expose your children to the idea of working a part time job or starting a small business like snow shoveling or baby sitting. For the financial concepts, take them to the local bank to open a bank account and then talk about basic banking concepts. Afterwards, you can move into more advanced ideas like investing and the power of compound interest.







4. Teach Credit, Debt, and Financial Responsibility (Ages

16-18) As teenagers get closer to adulthood, they should start to understand more complex topics like credit, debt, and long-term financial planning. Now is a great time to discuss the benefits and dangers of credit cards. Show them the math for not paying off your credit card at the end of every month. As an alternative to using credit cards, review saving for major items like

college or a car. You can even start to discuss saving for retirement. One fabulous game for experiencing the consequences of financial decisions is Monopoly. Play it with your kids and use opportunities to make real life correlations.




5. Use Resources & Tools

Throughout all ages, there are many online tools, games, and resources that can make learning about money more fun and interactive. Some online examples include websites like Khan Academy or Practical Money Skills which offer free educational resources. Apps like iAllowance or Bankaroo help kids manage their money digitally. Some reading material for older kids worth considering is "The Teen Investor" by Emmanuel Modu or "Rich

Dad Poor Dad for Teens" by Robert Kiyosaki. For those that prefer Podcasts, "Smart Money, Smart Kids" can also be valuable.



Children learn a lot from watching the adults around them. Be mindful of your own financial habits, such as budgeting, saving, and making thoughtful spending





The more interactive and enjoyable the process, the more likely kids will internalize the lessons. Use games, challenges, and rewards to keep them motivated and engaged.

By gradually building on these concepts, you can create a well-rounded foundation in finance that will serve them throughout their lives.


The members of Alpha-Agassiz Council (of which Don was a Past Regent), have followed in his

BAKER'S BOX: LIMONCINI COOKIES


Enjoy this recipe for tasty and delicious lemon cookies shared by Past Supreme Regent Errica Conforto. They're sure to become a favorite of every season!

Ingredients:

2 cups almond flour
1 1/2 cups flour
1/2 cup sugar
1 Tablespoon baking powder
pinch of salt
1 grated lemon
2 large eggs
1 oz. fresh lemon juice
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 Tablespoon almond extract
confectioners' sugar



Preheat oven to 365 degrees. In a bowl, add almond flour, regular flour, sugar, baking powder, salt, and grated lemon. Mix well. Add eggs, lemon juice, vanilla and almond extract and mix well to form a ball. (The dough will be sticky). Using a spoon, take a small amount of dough and form with your hands first into little balls then like potato croquettes. Then press each piece down to shape like a lemon. (Since the dough is sticky, use confectioners' sugar on your hands to mold the cookies). Roll the cookies in the confectioners' sugar and arrange on a parchment paper-lined cookie tray. Bake at 365 degrees for 10-12 minutes. Remove from oven. Cool completely and enjoy!


